Standing Up For Steel

Protecting Public Safety

Raising the Minimum Wage

Scott Moe continues to spend billions of dollars awarding public-sector contracts to international companies instead of creating jobs and opportunities within Saskatchewan.

The October 26, 2020 election will be different than past elections due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Elections Saskatchewan has implemented new processes and safety measures to protect voters.

How to vote

- **1. In-person** on election day: Your voter information card will detail your assigned voting location for October 26. Election day is the last day to vote. Polls on election day are open from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.
- **2. In-person** during advance voting: There are five days of advance voting to be held October 20-24. Your voter information card will detail the recommended polling location for you. Advance voting polls are open from noon to 8 p.m.
- **3. Vote by mail:** All voters are eligible to vote by mail. This is a two-step process that involves applying for a vote-by-mail ballot.

Under the Saskatchewan Election Act, an employee who is eligible to vote must be allowed three consecutive hours to cast their ballot. The employer, upon request, must allow the employee enough time off with pay to make up three consecutive hours to vote.

For the first time in a Saskatchewan election, any voter can choose to receive their voter information card by text or email rather than regular postal mail.
